s the calendar turned to 2023 your cooperative began to focus on our strategic objectives for the year ahead. Each year our biggest goal is to work as a cooperative to safely deliver you reliable energy that is affordable and environmentally responsible. Those are big picture objectives for us, and there are many things we work on each day to deliver on those goals.

We always begin with safety in mind. We want our staff to work safely each day and go home to their families. Our staff conducts regular safety briefings before and after each job, they attend safety training throughout the year, and we have a safety committee that meets to develop ways to work even safer. We also want our members to safely use electricity. Make sure you call 811 before starting any project that includes digging and please consult a licensed electrician before doing any wiring.

Reliability of electric service is of great importance to our members. At Dunn Energy our focus is on keeping your power reliable on the local level. We don't control the weather, the electric grid, or the transmission lines, so we have to focus on the maintenance and upgrading of our own distribution system. This year we will be completing larger projects in the Connorsville and Elk Mound areas. These projects will include upgrading wire and equipment serving those areas, with a goal of increased reliability and better service. We will also be upgrading several smaller lines and clearing rights-of-way in the Caryville, Rock Falls, and Connorsville areas. We don't sell any more energy when we do these projects, but an investment in our system is a benefit to our members, and the cooperative as a whole, with increased power quality. (140019035)

Part of keeping your power costs affordable is looking for ways to grow our cooperative and make it more efficient. Growth within our service territory only comes as new homes and businesses are added and when expansions

In 2023 we will also work to make the energy you receive more environmentally

responsible. As we announced last May, we will be partnering with One Energy Solar to develop two smallscale solar projects in our service territory. Each project will be about 12 acres in size and provide enough energy over the course of the year to power 400–600 average-sized homes. One project will be located in the town of Hay River and the other in the town of Tainter and they should be online by the end of the year. We also have just a few shares remaining in our community solar farm near Downsville that we would like to sell if there are members interested. If you are exploring solar energy for your own account, please give us a call early in the process so we can walk you through all the details.

As you can see it will be another busy year for the cooperative. We look forward to working day in and day out to serve the needs of our members in the year ahead.

THE SEVEN COOPERATIVE PRINCIPLES

Cooperatives around the world operate according to the same set of core principles and values, adopted by the International Co-operative Alliance. These principles are a key reason why America's electric cooperatives operate differently from other electric utilities, putting the needs of our members first.



Cooperatives are autonomous, self-help organizations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with other organizations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control by their members.



Cooperatives are voluntary organizations open to all persons able to use their services and willing to accept the responsibilities of membership, without gender, social, racial, political or religious discrimination.

 To be eligible: The applicant or their spouse must be a member of Dunn Energy Cooperative and a bona fide resident of the cooperative's service territory. The applicant must be in good standing with Dunn Energy Cooperative. The recipient must have maintained a 2.5 (or better) grade point average during their current quarter or semester of post-secondary education. The recipient must be enrolled in a course of study leading to an associate's or bachelor's degree or certificate. The recipient must be enrolled with a minimum of five (5) credits and be in good standing at the school they are attending. Children of full-time DEC employees or directors are not eligible. The non-traditional scholarship will be limited to a one-time award. After receiving a scholarship, the individual will not be eligible for future awards. The program must be a minimum of one year.
